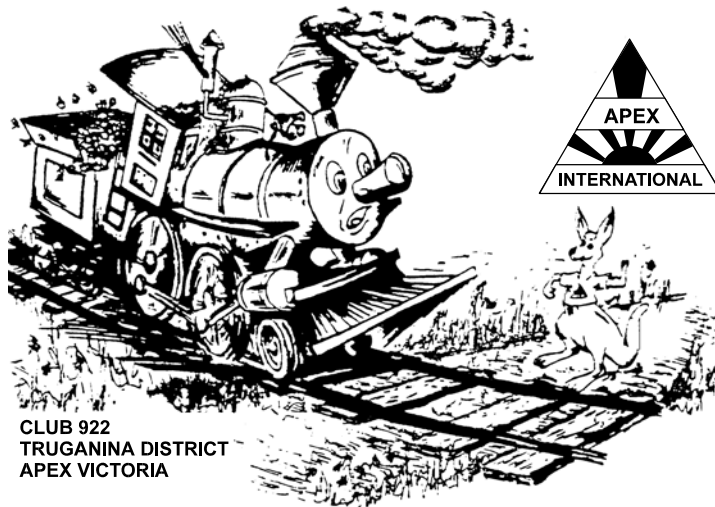

CLUB HIGHLIGHTS - 1989 to 1995

During the past 6 years, the members of the Apex Club of Hoppers Crossing Inc. have endeavoured to serve the local and broader community, and live up to the Ideals of Apex. Examination of this document clearly shows that we have been successful in this endeavour. Our activities have encompassed Service, Citizenship and Fellowship and have been of great value to the beneficiaries and our own members through learning and personal development.

This document details the Clubs achievements and highlights many of the activities undertaken during the period 1989 to 1995.

1. SERVICE

Hoppers Crossing Apex has had an impressive service record since its foundation. Since that time club members have contributed more than 26000 "service" hours to the community. These "service hours" include all activities where members have directly provided their time to assist the community including all fundraising related activities. However, this excludes many hours spent at club and district board meetings where essential planning for Apex activities occurs.

Over the past few years our clubs strong service tradition has continued. From 1989/90 to 1994/95 club members averaged 7.0 service hours per month, with the level of activity peaking in 1992/93 at 12.7 service hours per month.

This compares with average service activity per member of 6.1 hours per month from 1979/80 to 1983/84 and 8.6 hours per month from 1984/85 to 1988/89

Major service work undertaken by the club in recent years is listed below. Activities related to fundraising either for the club or for charities such as the Anti Cancer Council or the Red Shield appeal are mostly included in a separate section.

1989/90

Apex Park maintenance - this was the final year of involvement which had began in early 1980.

Blue Light Disco - assisted in operating.

Hoppers Crossing Special School maintenance.

1990/91

Blue Light Disco - assisted in operating.

1992/93

Secondary school first aid training - preliminary work on pilot project.

"Ambitions" Youth drop in centre at Woodville shopping centre - the club operated this for several months with Council assistance.

Free BBQ and badge making on the inaugural Apex National Children's Day.

Clean Up Australia Day.

Santa Claus visits.

Assistance with Open Day's at Quantin Binnah Community Centre and at Hogan's Road Playgroup.

Assistance with Kelly Park Family Fun Day.

Tree planting.

Wrapping goods for Chernobyl victims.

1993/94

Apex National Children's Day - a children's film day was organised.

Secondary school first aid training - pilot project undertaken.

The club was instrumental in the establishment of a youth motorkhana club in the City of Werribee.

A teenage "Battle of the Bands" was organised at Werribee Secondary College.

Construction of a playground fort at Quantin Binnah Community Centre, together with regular assistance with maintenance and lawn mowing at the Centre.

Maintenance at MS sufferer's house.

Assistance with BBQ's on Children's Hospital Family Day.

Wangaratta Flood relief- this was one of the most rewarding and memorable service activities ever undertaken by the club, with most club members and some wives at very short notice spending a very full day assisting farmers in the Wangaratta region when floods hit in late 1993.

1994/95

Clean Up Australia Day.

Assistance with BBQ's on Children's Hospital Family Day.

Painting at Cooriemungle Youth Camp.

Home Help - This was set up as a regular monthly program for the club to assist invalid people to do general yard maintenance such as mowing and weeding. It is done in conjunction with the Council who refer people to us.

1995/96 to date

Home Help program renamed Home Assistance. This is continuing to provide a strong "hands on focus" in the clubs service work each month.

Assistance was provided in shifting furniture and belongings to a woman referred to us by St Vincent de Paul.

Provision of security at a Werribee Secondary College "Battle of the Bands".

The club played a major role in organising BBQ's and cooking 5000 sausages on the Wyndham Children's Day Picnic.

The club has also submitted a motion "That Apex Victoria adopt Daffodil Day as an annual State Service Project". The idea being that it would provide Apex Victoria with an ongoing focus in the service area together with widespread publicity for Apex, whilst raising funds for research into cancer. This motion has been passed at district level and is to be submitted for approval at the Ballarat State Convention in February 1996.

3. CITIZENSHIP

The club has continued to have very strong credentials in the area of citizenship.

Members have represented the club at meetings involving a variety of community issues including, the current level crossing and road access crises in the City of Wyndham.

We have tackled community issues by writing articles to the local press and to relevant authorities, for example on issues such as:

- Improved funding for Werribee Hospital
- Saving the R.A.A.F Williams bases
- the location of a new jail in Wyndham City

Members have regularly attended Citizenship Ceremony's run by Wyndham (Werribee) Council where club members have presented the new Australian Citizens with either a gift or a certificate.

At times the club has attended Council meetings and in recent months the club was a

special guest of the Chief Commissioner Bernie Knight at a Council meeting where the club also enjoyed a free supper and drinks at the bar. This was put on for our benefit in recognition of the contribution our club makes to the betterment of our community.

Other important citizenship activities undertaken since 1989/90 have been:

- The organisation of community meetings on issues such as cuts to Kindergarten funding.
- Public awareness campaigns have been undertaken such as for "Sleep Safe Victoria" which related to smoke detectors and "Self Check Below Deck" which related to testicular cancer.
- The club has been involved in Senior Citizen Week organising outings, eg to Werribee Mansion.
- The club participated in the Werribee Citizen of the Year Committee from 1990 to 1992.
- Through Plan International the club continues to sponsor a child- Noel Parel who lives in the Philippines.

5. YOUTH

The club has had an ongoing commitment to the youth of our community. Over the past few years the club has continued to be involved in sponsoring a couple of young people each year to attend the Apex Youth Development Program. The feedback that we have received from the young people who were sent clearly indicates the great benefit this program has been to their own self development.

Many hundreds of service hours were put in by club members in the running of the Blue Light Disco's. This program which began in the early 1980's continued to be an important focus of the club's attention until 1992 when the Blue Light Disco's ceased.

In 1991/92, led by the initiative of Tony Long, the club approached the Council about establishing a youth drop in centre at the Woodville shopping centre. This resulted in the opening of the "Ambitions" youth centre in September 1992. This opened each Friday night and was staffed by both Council youth workers and members of our club. This operated successfully until March 1993 when due to a number of incidents involving youth in the vicinity of the Centre the Council decided to close the venue.

1992/93 also saw the inaugural Apex National Children's Day, with the club joining with Werribee Apex to run a free BBQ and badge making day at the local football.

Information on Child Protection was also promoted and distributed on the day. In the following year the club again joined with Werribee Apex to run a free film day and promote child protection.

Other important youth initiatives by the club in recent years include:

- a pilot project for secondary school students to obtain first aid certificates, which was done in conjunction with St Johns Ambulance. This resulted in 21 Galvin Park secondary students obtaining their certificates.
- in March 1994 the club ran a Battle of the Bands at Werribee Secondary College.
- the club was instrumental in the formation of a committee of young people and adults to establish a motorkhana club in Wyndhamvale.
- provision of Christmas presents to disadvantaged children, either directly organised with the Council or as part of the K Mart Magic Wishing Tree.
- the provision of funds for disadvantaged youth to attend special youth development camps, such as was recently run at Derrimut Heath Primary School.
- last month the club provided BBQ's and assisted in cooking 5000 sausages at the Wyndham Children's Picnic, where information on the "importance of listening to children and speaking to them in ways which avoid destroying their self confidence" was promoted and distributed.

7. INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

International Relations is often referred to as 'the forgotten Ideal'. This is certainly not the case at Hoppers Crossing.

The Club has always taken its commitment to IR seriously. Through John Park, the Club was represented on an Apex Work party to Bangladesh during 1988-89, and also his attendance at WOCO Conventions.

As a club, we have maintained sponsorship of a overseas foster child through Plan International. We have also been involved in events a little closer to home, such as hosting Melcos Students, involvement with the Victims of Chernobyl group and a visit from Australia's ambassador to UNESCO, The Hon. Barry Jones, M.H.R.

By far, our largest International Relations project has been the twinning and exchange arrangement with the Apex Club of Lautoka, Fiji. Instigated by John Park in 1990-91, the program has seen three Club members in Tony Long, Michael Nash and Michael

Link travel to Fiji to be hosted by Lautoka, and to attend the Fiji National Convention. We have also been visited by and hosted two members from Lautoka in Rajesh Madho and Shameem Kahn. This twinning of the two Clubs has also seen Hoppers Crossing supporting financially work efforts in Fiji following disastrous cyclones in 1992-93. It is hoped that we can continue 'To promote international understanding and friendship' for many years to come.

9. FUNDRAISING

Fundraising is an area that the Club has continued to excel. The Club has been involved in a wide and varied number of fundraising events, which have seen many thousands of dollars raised and put back into the local community.

These can be broken up into five groups:

Sale of Labour. We have been involved in marshalling for the Australian Open Golf, Moomba Parade, Walk Against Want, Air Shows Downunder, Rev Walk and a Biathlon. We continue to wrap State News magazines, we have mowed vacant blocks and washed cars.

Sale / Hire of Goods. We continue large scale sale of Christmas Trees, we have sold Apex Candy, Apex Shortbreads, made and sold food and fairy floss. Recently we have also purchased a fairy floss machine which we use for our own fundraising purposes, or hire out to other users.

Catering. We have catered for a DG School and an A-Team school, a large Equestrian 3 day event and many other functions we have run or been involved with.

Support for other Groups. We have rattled tins, door knocked or collected for the Red Cross, Salvation Army, Legacy, SIDS through sale of Red Noses, Blue Hats for Peter Mac and Daffodils for Cancer research.

Entrepreneurial. The Club has been actively involved in the recycling of glass and aluminium. Our two largest and most successful fund raising activities also fall into this category, and they are, of course, the Home Show and the Model Show.

1989 saw the inaugural staging of the Apex Home Show, which was repeated again in 1990 and 1992. The concept of staging a large scale Home Show was formulated by Bruce Reid and Wayne Evans, who saw the project as a great way of raising funds for the community as well as raising the profile of Apex.

The Home Show's were extremely successful, raising many thousands of dollars for the local community. Profits from the first two shows were used to purchase a 18 seat bus

for the Heathdale Community Centre, and profits from the 1992 show were used to purchase an \$18,000 piece of equipment for the Werribee Hospital. Both of these donations have been of ongoing benefit to the community.

1989 also saw the introduction of the Apex Train Show, which later evolved into the Apex Model Show. Run over 4 years all four show's were successful fund raisers for the club, bringing in much needed cash for use with many community based projects.

11. MEMBERSHIP

Overall 96 young men have had the experience of being members of our club since it was founded, providing the equivalent of hundreds of man years service to the community. Of those 96 members, 19 have given 5 or more years service to the club. Current member Gordon Clarence is now our longest serving club member with Gordon as at November 1995 being in the club for over 13 years.

Apex club membership is an area that concerns all Clubs today. With a decline in community interest in the service concept together with many other leisure activities available, the ability to overcome membership shortages is not easy. During the 1980's our club was able to resist the general fall off in service club membership but in the last few years the club's membership has suffered.

The club's past membership as at Handover each year is listed as follows.

The club's membership bottomed in early 1995, but since that time a rekindled club spirit and a strong desire to see this club live on as important contributor to our community has seen the club rally with 5 members inducted since February.

These five inductions in one year are a healthy sign for the club and compare with only 5 members inducted over the three years from 1992 to 1994.

Membership remains a major ongoing challenge for the club.

13. SOCIAL

One thing we can do well is have a good time and in recent years we have had some very memorable social functions.

A number of club social institutions which developed in the club's first 10 years have been continued very successfully in more recent times.

-Cup Eve and the Melbourne Cup breakfast have continued to be a highlight of the social calendar.

- The annual "A La Mess" progressive dinner is still providing a forum for our guys to show the ladies their culinary ability. Michael Nash's cake and slice making ability have particularly stood out in recent years.

- Grunga's Bash formerly known as Munga's Bash, at Indented Head has continued to be a particularly enjoyable family BBQ and beach day out.

- Grand final day get together's have also proved to be memorable, mainly because of the number of Geelong supporters in the club and the ongoing ability of Geelong to keep losing Grand Finals.

An important social event which has developed in recent years is the annual Cooriemungle family weekend away which began in 1990/91.

During 1994/95 a system of monthly family days held at alternate houses was introduced which has been very successful in bonding the club members and their families together. These monthly family days have continued in the current Apex year and are a key social focus for the club.

15. PUBLIC SPEAKING AND DEBATING

The club has had considerable success in debating over the past 12 years winning the district debating shield on six occasions. The years we were successful are as follows:

1983/84
1985/86
1986/87
1988/89
1989/90
1992/93

Our success has been due to more than good debating. It is due to the number of members prepared to have a go at this character building exercise. Each year we have had at least 6 members who have gained great experience by having a go.

If you look at the names of those which have participated, you will see that each year we have included new debaters and not relied on the more experienced performers. Club members have also gained experience in debating from intra-club debates that we have held on occasion. In 1993/94 three members got the opportunity to try and debate against the ladies on the topic "That size doesn't matter", which was only the second occasion in the club's history that we have had a debate against the ladies. Once again the ladies won.

The club has also assisted in the development of our youth through involvement in organising Secondary School debating.

The club's success in debating has flowed onto the public speaking area:

- 1989/90 Evan Hopkins was the runner up in the District public speaking final.
- 1990/91 Tony Long won both the District and Regional public speaking finals and was runner up in the State final.
- 1991/92 Chris Egger was runner up in the District debating final but due to the ineligibility of the winner to go on, Chris represented the District at the Regional final.
- Chris again enjoyed success at the 1994/95 District public speaking final winning the competition and will compete again in the Regional final in the very near future.

Public speaking continues to be an important part of the self development of our club members with all members participating in 5 minute talks during the year and in other shorter impromptu speeches.

In 1991/92 the inaugural John Park Public Speaking Competition was introduced as an internal club competition. The name of the competition was later changed to the Graeme Lockyer Morrison public speaking competition in honour of Graeme who is now deceased. Winners of this competition to date are:

17. APEX LADIES

The wives of the members of the Hoppers Crossing Apex Club have continued to support the Club and the community well.

They have continued with their monthly get togethers, during which they have enjoyed many varied activities, such as craft nights, video nights and ten pin bowling, as well as interclub visits with the Werribee and Altona Apex Club ladies. They have also supported the Clubs mixed nights well, particularly the traditional nights such as A La Mess, Cup Eve and Handover, as well as cheering the men on at Debating and Public Speaking competitions.

But there is more to the Hoppers Crossing Apex ladies than just social gatherings. Aside from their support of their husbands with their Apex activities, the ladies have been involved in many service projects in their own right. The ladies formed part of the regular roster for the snacks trolley at the old Werribee Hospital, and have successfully catered for many major Apex activities including the Home and Model shows. The success of their fundraising activities saw the womens group, under the leadership of Arlene Protetto, present the Club with a trailer during the 1991/92 Apex year.

The women have also shown that they are not too shabby when it comes to debating, either. 1993/4 saw the Ladies show who really does have the gift of the gab when they cleaned up the men (again) in a men versus women debate. It was eight or nine years since the previous debate, and it is likely to be just as long before the men are game enough to re-issue the challenge.

19. DINNER MEETINGS

In 1989 the club met regularly at Kendall Hall at the Melbourne University Veterinary School. This venue proved to be good until mid 1993 when due to a downturn in the quality of the meals the club sought other venues.

Club meetings then moved to the Quantin Binnah Community Centre during 1993/94. However, this venue did not prove to be conducive to good meetings and we then tried other venues such as Master Wok and the Bridge Hotel during 1994/95. None of these proved to be suitable for regular meetings either. The lack of a good and stable dinner meeting venue contributed to the decline in membership in the club over this time.

However, Life member Bruce Reid seeing the club's dilemma generously offered his offices and meeting room as a regular venue for the club, with the club meeting there

now since May 1995. This venue has been a key factor in the renewed club spirit as we now have a stable meeting venue which is private and conducive to good meetings and where we are able to leave our club banners etc. In effect it is like having our own club rooms. This luckily coincided with Steve Ryan joining the club who has excellent skills in catering. Steve now provides the club with great meals at a very affordable price.

21. INTERCLUB VISITING

The club has continued its involvement in inter-club visiting, averaging approximately 4 or 5 visits to other clubs each year. These visits have generally been related with the District Debating competition, however we have continued to participate in what have become 'traditional' inter-club visits. The first of these has been annual games nights against Altona, the second being the Brownlow night hosted by Tullamarine / Essendon. Both are great nights, which are looked forward to by the Club.

We have also attended joint meetings with the Hoppers Crossing Lions Club on a couple of occasions, as well as attending a Mass Inter Club Visit at the Meredith Hotel where we met up with Clubs from the Geelong and Ballarat area's.

23. DINNER NOTICE

The Hoppexian has remained the communication conduit for the Club during the past five years. A feature of the Hoppexian has been the consistent high standard of content and presentation, which has been assisted in recent years by the acquisition of a Club photocopier. The Club repeated its earlier successes of 1984/85 and 1988/89 when in 1991/92 when the Hoppexian, with Michael Nash as Editor, again won the District Dinner Notice award.

Additions in recent years such as the Phone Tree, Calendar of Events and Congratulations Page listing birthdays and anniversaries, have made The Hoppexian a 'must read' for all members of the Club.

25. CONVENTIONS

Convention attendance is one area where the Club has really increased its activity, reaching a stage where there are a number of members who just won't miss a Convention.

Club members have really gotten into the swing of State Conventions, particularly the

Saturday night fancy dress function. The club has been represented at State Conventions held at Geelong, Albury, Shepparton, Melbourne and Warrnambool and has appeared dressed as killer tomatoes, plum puddings, money, a day at the races and the crew from Gilligans Island in recent years, just to name a few. All those who have attended the State Conventions have enjoyed the friendships and socialising which can be found at large Apex gatherings.

A few members have also become regular attendees at National Conventions. The Club has been represented at National Conventions held in Perth, Darwin, Morwell, Burnie and Newcastle, as well as Fiji National Conventions on three occasions and two Apex International Conventions.

27. STATE / NATIONAL REPRESENTATION

Being a part of an Apex Club is a challenging and rewarding experience. Representing Apex at higher levels carries with it greater challenges, and greater rewards. Again, this is an area of which the Club can be extremely proud of its achievements. In its short history of 15 years since it was Chartered, the Club has been represented at the State or National level for a total of 11 of those years. Following on from the example set by John Park and Des O'Shanassy; Tony Long, Peter Protetto and Michael Nash have all accepted the challenge of higher office.

Tony Long took on the role of Zone 1 Publicity and Communication Chairman in 1989/90, which he followed up in 1990/91 as the first Apex Victoria Communication and Education Chairman. Tony then served a two year term as National Youth Chairman during 1991/92 and 1992/93, and currently holds the position of State Secretary during the 1995/96 Apex Year. Peter Protetto was the Truganina District Governor in 1993/94, the role which Michael Nash has taken on during 1995/96.
