1. 10 YEARS ON-

In 1979 Werribee Apex Club placed an article in the Werribee Banner concerning the possibility of forming a new Apex Club in Hoppers Crossing. I telephoned Phillip Incoll (Werribee Apex Extension Officer) to indicate my interest, having had only 12 months of previous Apex experience back in 1974 at Swan Hill.

Phillip was keen to maintain my interest because at that stage, few other people had expressed a desire to get involved. He took me to a Werribee Meeting at the Bridge Hotel in July and I can remember how crowded it was - they had in excess of 30 members in those days.

In 1984, I wrote "The First Five Years", which contains detail of how those formative years went for the young Hoppers Crossing Apex Club.

Well here we are 10 years on, Bruce Reid and myself are the only Charter Members still in the Club and we have seen many Apexians come and go. 74 Apexians have served the Club to the tune of about 200 man years! Ironically, though the average length of a member's stay in the Club is only 2.7 years due to a moving population, the 40 year cut out and the inability of some members to maintain interest. Only 11 members in the history of the Club have notched up more than 5 years of service.

This document is designed to pick up where the First Five Years left off and basically covers the doings of the Club in the 1984 to 1989 period. The format is similar to the original history and I have endeavoured to cover all the activities worth noting in that period.

2. WHAT HAPPENED 1984-1989

2.1 SERVICE

In the First 5 Years, I suggested that we had an impressive service record and hoped that it would continue. I feel that this has been the case and the Club does enjoy a good record of service in the Werribee community.

We have continued our work at the Woodville Apex Park although the amount of time spent is less now due to the variety of other projects.

Blue light Discos similarly have seen a lesser involvement by Club members due to fewer being represented on the Committee. The Blue Light Committee now has a broader membership from other community groups, although Blue light President, Tony Long is now a member of our Club also. Club members still attend Discos to help with supervision and our wives are still involved in helping at the Disco Shop.

Involvement in Weerama has continued with our Trash 'n Treasure stall being held each year and still returning a good profits to the Club. This year, although the weather was against us and the concept was going stale, we still made over \$600 which went to the 1987/89 Apex Australia Scheme, "Melanoma". There is no doubt that our success in this venture is due to member's enthusiasm in selling all junk at any price and of course, our excellent hamburgers and hot dogs.

Service Work over the last 5 years has included the following:-

1984/85 Tree planting and erection of two pergolas at the Special Development School.

Apex Australia Scheme, 'Let's help beat diabetes' - we raised \$1,500 from a raffle, bike ride to the National Convention at Bendigo, an IR Night and a 'beard shave' which saw Service Director, Bob Metsel have his beard shaved off at the Handover Dinner by sponsors who paid for the privilege!

Installation of shelving at the Spring Drive Kindergarten Painting of the Mossfiel Community Hall.

Support to the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

Our first Boxing Night at Centenary Hall following the suggestion and hard work of our 'boxer' member Paul Rogan.

1985/86 Sold followed at Werribee Apex Tractor Pull, Weerama and the Community Awareness Day Fete at Woodville Park.

Volunteers for marshalling at the Moomba Procession.

Delivery of 13,000 Yellow Pages to the Werribee area.

Another Boxing Night which raised \$600.

Purchased a mower and brush cutter for Club service work.

Henley at Hoppers - after poor weather and poor response from the local community, the Club after earnest discussion decided to disband this concept.

1986/87 Continued grounds work at the Special School including relocation of the sand pit.

Assisted contractor to install a sprinkler system at the Woodville Apex Park.

Tree planting at several parks (more than 500 trees) in Hoppers Crossing as part of an Apex Australia Project.

The 3rd and last Boxing Night, again not being able to attract sufficient spectators for the work involved we reluctantly disbanded this project.

Installation and removal of the speaker towers from the MCG on Grand Final Day, a project which involved 100 District 10 and 11 Apexians and a great experience to be on the ground in front of a capacity crowd.

Sale of Christmas trees which proved to be very successful even though Des O'Shanassy and John Park lit a minor bush fire at the Special School to get rid of unsold trees.

Selling of Bicentenary souvenirs before they were to be released to commercial businesses.

1987/88 and **1988/89** Have seen us involved in our traditional service activities. Through the efforts of Steve Craven, the Club bought the materials and erected two picnic shelters at Apex Park. Continued vandalism at the park has been a problem. Starting with ripping out the trees we planted, they moved to graffiti on the picnic shelters to eventually damaging one so much that the Council had to rebuild it earlier this year.

Apex Variety Concert - Grants were made during Australia's Bicentennial Year to run community events and the Club was able to gain funding to run an Apex Variety Concert as part of the 1988 Weerama at Kelly Park. The concert was extremely successful due to the efforts of Chairman, John Knight and 'the music man', Mark 'Baby' Bunting. Club members frantically

sold drinks, hot dogs and hamburgers to the masses who turned out in the great weather. Apex Shed - purchased together with Hoppers Crossing Lions Club from the Country Fire Authority in 1988, only to find that the City of Werribee required it to be moved from the D1 Drain. We have at this stage commenced for the move by removing internal partitions and the Council has had foundations poured at the new site adjacent to the new Fire Station.

In Nov/Dec 1988, I had the opportunity of representing our Club as a member of the 1988 Zone One Work Party to Bangladesh, where we completed the construction and equipping of the Choto Bonogram Apex Village in the town of Rajshani. This village provides employment for 150 destitute women who have families but no breadwinner. A unique service opportunity which added another dimension to my Apex career. Home Show- The brain child of Bruce Reid and Wayne Evans, this show was held in July 1989 at the Centenary Hall.

60 display stalls were set up and Wayne and Bruce ensured that every little detail was attended to. As a result of this and the fact that all members and wives helped out on the weekend, this project has been the most professional and successful project ever undertaken by the Club.

At the time of writing this history, details of the funds raised are not known, however Wayne and Bruce and fellow Committee members, Trevor Brougham and Ashley Sked deserve our congratulations.

2.2 MEMBERSHIP

Apex Club membership is an area that concerns all Clubs today. With the decline in community interest in the service concept together with many other leisure activities available, the ability to overcome membership shortages is not easy.

The Club's membership over the years has fluctuated as follows-

Membership has steadily declined and with 3 members retiring next year, I believe that the Club has its most important membership challenge of its life in the coming year.

2.3 DINNER MEETING

You might recall from the first history that our early Dinner Meetings were held at the Bridge Hotel, however we soon moved to the Werribee RSL to be more autonomous from the Werribee Apex Club.

We continued to meet at the RSL until Dinner Meeting 174 on 2nd November 1987, when members reluctantly voted to try other venues due to several poor meals.

We settled on Blasers Disco at the Plaza Tavern and for the first time in our history, began meeting regularly in Hoppers Crossing. Unfortunately the pleasant surroundings and good meals, together with the stubbies on ice was too good to last, and a change of Manager, saw us move again, in July 1988.

Following the 1988 Handover Dinner we began meeting at Kendall Hall at the Melbourne University Vet. School. This venue has been quite good and we should continue here for some time.

2.4 CITIZENSHIP

Citizenship embodies the Club members' Apex knowledge and the Club's ability to be an effective service organisation in the community.

Citizenship in this Club has been strong as we have always strived to learn more about Apex and consequently become a more effective club in the Werribee area.

In 1984 the Shire of Werribee initiated a community committee to organise the annual Werribee Citizen of the Year Award. Hoppers Crossing Apex Club was invited to nominate the first Chairman of this committee and I took on that role.

The award was won by the late Baden Powell and I was assisted by a representative of both the Werribee Lions Club and the Hoppers Crossing Rotary Club. The committee rotates amongst service organisations each year and our club can expect to be involved in 2 or 3 years time.

Members have regularly attended Werribee Australian Citizenship Ceremonies in recent years and enjoyed a cup of tea and cakes 'on the council'. The Club has also provided Guest Speakers for these ceremonies in Bruce Reid and John Park.

The Club successfully ran an Apex Education Night for new members which developed into a District function only disappear this year. The Club should consider re-introducing this concept for our own benefit.

The MMBW in 1985/86 requested service clubs do nominate people from the local area to participate in a 12 month 'odour survey'. John Park and Geoff Goodwin were duly nominated and after intensive training by the MMBW earned the Club \$400 for a year of sniffing the wonderful odours of the Werribee area.

In May 1986 we became an Incorporated Association under the Associations' Incorporation Act to protect members from individual legal action.

Club members have represented the Club at meetings on a variety of community issues including the Toxic Waste Dump, increased community use of the community bus and more recently is represented on the Skateboard Ramp's Steering Committee.

We have also tackled community issues by writing articles to the local press such as the vandalism at the Apex Park. In 1986, Des O'Shanassy managed to talk the Werribee Telegraph into running a regular report entitled 'Serving Our Community'. Des was able to get the Club tremendous publicity through this newspaper until it fortunately ceased publication.

2.5 SOCIAL

One thing we can do well is have a good time and in recent years we have had some great social functions.

The Melbourne Cup Breakfast at Mossfiel Reserve has become an institution after one went for something like 12 hours back in 1985!

The A La Mess Concept continues to be successful with the boys still able to amaze our wives with our culinary ability. This year saw it run on the progressive concept using 5 different homes- must have been designed to keep us sober, we were always on the road and so unable to drink.

Other events which have continued are-
Morrison's Beach and BBQ day at Indented Head now affectionately known as 'Munga's Bash' after Doug Greig (the Club's 'nicknamer', who bestowed this title on Graeme).

Our annual Cricket Match against Williamstown which after our first triumph in 1985 at Willi. where we won, has seen us play at Little River Reserve and retain the cup even though Willi. enlisted the support of Altona Apex Club this year.

We have also had some memorable Grand Final afternoons (and nights) where we have tried our luck at Footy Trivia, handball competitions and even trying to emulate the players on the day!.

The Kids' Christmas Party at the Special School is still a nice quiet social day leading up to a busy Christmas. Father Christmas of late, Rob Thompson manages to get the kids to sit on his knee even though they all know it's Mr. Thompson.

In April 1986 we even had a Halley's Comet Night which saw a handful of members and wives huddle around a campfire at Cobbledicks Ford over a few stubbies. We did see the comet although it was not a clear sighting. How many of our members will see it next time around!.

2.6 YOUTH

In the first 5 years I said that this is probably the most important area for the future of our Club due to the youngness of our community. In fact with the teenage population of Werribee expected to peak around the year 2000, we must continue our efforts in this area.

The future viability of Apex in our area depends on what we can do for youth and the manner in which we make the youth aware of Apex.

1984/85 saw us with a representative on the now defunct Municipal Youth Advisory Group and CYSS. We also sent 2 underprivileged children to the Apex Magic Castle at Smiggin Holes as

part of the District 10 Service Project.

1984/85 projects included-

- presenting 30 disadvantaged children with Christmas presents, a project introduced by Wayne Evans.
- sending 2 local children to Camp Quality, a camp for children suffering from cancer.
- formation of the Werribee Summit Club at Werribee South

In recent times our youth commitment has been very much heightened by Des O'Shanassy and Robert Thompson. Both have been actively involved with Zone One's Community Youth Development Program (CYDP), and Summit.

This culminated with Des taking on the role of Zone One Youth Chairman in 1987/88 and restructuring CYDP into the now successful Apex Youth Development Program (AYDP).

Unfortunately for Des, the Werribee Summit Club went into recess and his efforts to re-introduce the concept into the Hoppers Crossing Community have been unsuccessful to date.

2.7 PUBLIC SPEAKING AND DEBATING

Our success with the District Westgate Shield Debating Competition has continued-

The name of the Shield was changed at the 1988 District Convention to the John Park Shield and won in the first year, 1988/89 by us again.

Our success has been due to more than good debating, It is due to the number of members prepared to have a go at this character building exercise. Each year we have had at least 6 members who have gained great experience by having a go.

If you look at the names of those who have participated, you will see that each year we have included new debaters and not relied on the more experienced performers.

This success has naturally flowed on to the Public Speaking area also. Apexians Doug Greig and Mark Bunting became the first Hoppers Crossing Apexians to participate in the Zone One Public Speaking Competition. In 1986, Doug Greig represented the Club in the District 10 Barry Armstrong Public Speaking Competition and won. Doug, who does not need to use one (as it was publicly announced at a past Handover dinner !), spoke to the topic of "Condoms".

Doug obviously enjoyed speaking on this topic and came third in the Zone Public Speaking Competition held that year at Halls Gap at the Zone Convention.

In 1988 at the District Convention at Melton, Mark Bunting repeated the performance with this

topic "Hats". Mark enjoyed further success in winning the Zone Public Speaking Competition at the 1988 Zone One Convention at Wendouree.

At the 1989 National Convention held at Dubbo, Mark performed once again, representing Zone One in the National Public Speaking Competition and although not winning put in a great performance. Congratulations Mark.

In 1985 Club Members challenged a team of wives in a Mixed Debate which saw the polished and spidery ladies win. We have not been game to challenge them since!.

2.8 **INTERCLUB VISITING**

Interclub Visiting is a great experience and one which advances the meaning and spirit of Fellowship.

Club members have regularly visited other District 10 Clubs and every now and then headed further afield. We regularly visit Altona or they visit us to compete for the 'Toilet Seat' trophy- who knows what sort of crazy games we will play next!

This year saw us visit Sunbury Club for a games night and we brought home the 'Straw Broom' trophy- can Mark find it?

2.9 **DINNER NOTICE**

The Club's Hoppexian has continued to hold a high standard set when the Club started out.

This was highlighted when Geoff Goodwin won the 1983/84 Zone Dinner Notice Trophy and in 1984/85 when John Park won the inaugural District 10 Dinner Notice Award.

The District 10 Award has again been won by the Club this year (1988/89) by Tony Long. Tony's ambition to win the National Award and judging by the high standard he has maintained this year, I reckon he has a good chance.

Averaging 30 pages, each issue has been packed with well set out information which makes it an excellent communicator.

Des 'Tolstoy' O'Shanassy continues to supply volumes of information, what will we do when he retires!

2.10 **FUND RAISING**

Many of the Club's service activities have raised significant amounts of money which the Club has donated to a variety of needy causes.

We have always had good attendance at Golf Tournaments and the Moomba Marshalling and together with projects like the Trash and Treasure and Christmas Trees, we have raised large amounts of money.

Funds which have been used for service purposes are as follows - 1984/85 \$985.70; 1985/86

\$4,570; 1986/87 \$5,375; 1987/88 \$1,606.60.

2.11 APEX LADIES

The ladies continue to support us well and meet once a month for social evenings. They have also assisted in our service projects where they are able.

We usually manage to have a couple of mixed Dinner Meetings each year and they are enjoyable nights which are well attended by the ladies.

Memorable nights include the mixed debate mentioned earlier and our 200th Dinner in December 1988. The theme of this night was our bicentennial dinner in Australia's Bicentennial year and members and wives dressed accordingly.

Held at the Vet. School, we had bushies, cockies, convicts and so on, and had a great social night.

2.12 CONVENTIONS

Those Club members who have attended Apex Conventions really understand the value of these events to Apex.

The Club hosted the District 10 Convention in 1986 at Werribee Park and will host the first District 7 Convention in 1990 after the restructure of Zone One's Districts to occur on 1/9/89.

Members have continued to support Zone One Conventions with good attendances at Portland (1984), Warrnambool (1985), Mount Gambier (1986), Halls Gap (1987) and Wendouree (1988). We have always enjoyed the opportunity to dress up for the theme for the Saturday night functions. Probably the most memorable were the 'cockatoos' at Halls Gap.

The true spirit of Apex is enjoyed at attendance at National Conventions and I have had the opportunity to attend all but one of these Conventions since 1981. Both Mark and I together with Heather and Janet had a great time at Dubbo this year and will be encouraging all of you to come along to Morwell in 1990.

I have further been fortunate to have been able to attend World Council of Young Men Service Clubs (WOCO) Conventions in Dublin (1984) and Hobart (1988). These conventions are real highlights and have given me the opportunity to meet Apexians, Round Tablers, etc from all over the World.

2.13 Zone One Board

In the last 5 years, 2 Club Members have served Apex at Zone level, Des O'Shanassy and John Park. The 'Park appetite' for Apex at Zone level concluded last year after I served as Zone President and concurrently as Apex State President.

Des also took the opportunity of serving Apex over a wider area by taking on the portfolio of Zone Youth Chairman with 'Parky's Pink Panthers'! Des has also, almost single handedly, carried the Association's activity with Summit. He served as Zone Summit Liaison Officer and in the

last 2 years has been Apex National Summit Officer. Des's effort and involvement in the area of Youth for our Association has been outstanding.

We have, therefore, been able to put Hoppers Crossing on the 'Apex Map' and the Club enjoys an excellent reputation at Zone level.

Tony Long will continue this by serving as Zone One Publicity and Communications Chairman in the coming year.

In September 1988, we hosted Zone Board for the second time (the first hosting was in May 1983). The Board met at the Werribee Civic Centre and members and their families were home hosted by Club Members. We had a great Saturday night function at the Mossfield Hall.
